

### WE ANSWER ONLY TO THE PEOPLE

In many of the cases, school principals and certain members of school governing bodies (SGBs) collude in corrupt acts.

Where parents are unaware of their responsibilities in demanding transparency and accountability from the school, the corruption can only manifest and grow. When school funds are not used for the functions they are budgeted for, there is a big risk of learners not getting textbooks, stationery, clean toilets, sound chairs and desks and a nutritious meal, as is their right.



#### Theft of funds

Money taken without following processes.



#### Financial mismanagement

Inaccurate record/spending of school finances.



#### Theft of goods

Property and resources are taken by teachers, principals & SGB members.



#### **Tender corruption**

Principals & SGB members manipulate procument process to enrich themselves.



#### **Employment corruption**

Principals & SGB members manipulate interview scores in favour of a particular applicant.



#### **Ghost learners and teachers**

Principals inflate school rolls to acquire more funds.



#### Payments in no-fee schools

Principals demand payments from learners, despite it being no-fee schools.

## "REPORT CORRUPTION & ACTIVELY PROMOTE ACCOUNTABLE LEADERSHIP."

We encourage everyone living in South Africa to report corruption to us via our various platforms:

My child attends Parkview Secondary School in Kuruman in the Northern Cape. I am worried about some of the things that are happening at the school. The principal of the school is responsible for purchasing food items for the school's feeding scheme. The principal made a deal with a local shop owner to increase the prices of the products bought by the school. The store normally sells sunflower oil for R60.00 but on the school invoices. the oil was bought for R100.00. A few concerned parents confronted the local shop owner who admitted that the principal requested that the prices be inflated so that he could get some money from the profits. The principals and some of the teachers also take food items that are meant for the feeding scheme for themselves and the children are left without food for days.
